In a nutshell...

Throughout this unique summer school, open to doctoral students, post-doctoral fellows and researchers, participants will reflect upon the meaning of family in today's social environment: its characterization, importance, and associated challenges.

As highlighted by current debates on same-sex marriage, medically assisted procreation, and most recently the increased focus on the household due to the ongoing health crisis (social distancing, teleworking, homeschooling, etc.), family science is a major research subject for the 21st century.

The role played by family in our daily lives is constantly evolving, and as such touches a variety of different disciplines. However, current research often remains too confined to its specific, singular field.

By offering an interdisciplinary perspective, course content will allow for exchanges in order to define future research guidelines and enhance international collaboration, thus contributing to innovation on this important subject.

Expertise upon completion

Throughout the program, participants will:

- › Broaden their understanding of family science through an interdisciplinary focus,
- › Obtain an in-depth overview of the discipline's most recent scientific developments,
- › Foster new research perspectives and facilitate the implementation of current data in the socio-economic field.

WHY BORDEAUX?

This summer school's organizing committee includes academics and researchers from the University of Bordeaux and Paris (France), as well as members of Clubhouse Bordeaux, a living space created for and with people suffering from psychological disorders in order to facilitate their socialization and professional reintegration. Members of an association of families, with relatives suffering from mental illness, are also involved in the design and animation of the program, representing those directly affected by the latest scientific research findings.

Together, the organizing committee has developed a program based on disciplinary openness, scientific quality and international diversity, with an integrative approach to training. As a result, the theme of the family will be considered in its most fundamental aspect with presentations of translational research in epigenetics, neurosciences, and economic, clinical and social sciences.
